Message from our Leaders

A LOOK UNDER THE HOOD


Dear Church,

Coming out of COVID has felt a lot more like climbing Gannett Peak than climbing the Grand. (Brian would know.) While the apex of the Global Pandemic is in our rearview mirrors, it's taken an awfully long time to get back to normal. 2022 has felt like that long walk back to the trailhead that some enjoy and others dread.

Our clergy year began quietly, marked by some behind the scenes recruitment of The Rev. Dr. Travis Helms. As we took a deep look at how we might resurrect our Children, Youth and Families Ministry, we also began to think of how we could capture talent that could assist in the creation and leadership of additional communities within our own community of St. John's. I'm happy to say Travis, Gracie and Baby Helen fit like a glove at St. John's and in Jackson Hole. The winter also saw Mary Erickson come alongside women in our parish to establish a weekly lunch for women in the community. The women's ministry has flourished under Mary's leadership and included a late spring retreat in Cody over the Memorial Day Weekend at our Diocesan Retreat—Thomas The Apostle Center, and evolved into Gathering Women, monthly dinner and worship.

As we moved from winter toward spring, we as a church took a keen focus on restoring our relationships that were so solid long before we had ever heard of the corona virus. We kicked off the season of Lent with an absurd dance video from staff set to the music from High School Musical—"Better Together." Each of us received a package of peanut butter and jelly, and we began to turn our attention to the work of the restoration of relationships that took an important hiatus during the pandemic. We worked deliberately to restore a solid Children's Ministry Program on Sunday mornings with nursery for our infants and babies and weekly children's chapel led by one of us on the clergy team. Just as we began to use our south wing for Children's Ministry, our fire suppression system failed, creating a disaster on the ground floor and in the basement. Clergy and lay staff, alongside vestry and many other volunteers, worked to turn lemons into lemonade, allowing us to make improvements in the destroyed spaces that reflect more of the present future of our ministries and mission. We can't tell you how many times our minds drifted back to that ironically titled album of John Prine—"Lost Dogs. Mixed Blessings." The work of repairing and restoring the building was monumental, and so many from our parish spent time and energy helping to bring us back.

Our seemingly endless spring in 2022 turned to summer almost as abruptly as our beloved seasonal members arrived. Our parish is in full bloom in the summer, and we came together under the theme of "Peace Like a River"—Bars of Dove Soap making their way into kitchens and bathrooms and laundry rooms and workshops across the valley. The simple task of praying while washing our hands brought a measure of calm to what has been a tough few years for everyone. In June, we welcomed the Helms family as residents of Jackson and members of our church community and staff. We participated in the celebration of Christie Laughery's ordination to the Diaconate. We provided thousands of expressions of love from our ice cream e-bikes, including on the 4th of July in the town parade. We witnessed Suzanne Harris bring so many from our parish and community together again under the banner of poetry, music, movement and lyric. And, the staff stole away for a three-day teambuilding packtrip to Tin Can Park in the Gros Ventre Mountains.




One of the most meaningful highlights of the summer was our "Armada of Love" float down the Snake River culminating in a number of baptisms at the confluence of Pacific Creek and The Snake—some planned and others spontaneous.

The summer continued full steam ahead, as usual. Adjacent development forced a sewer reconnection on our campus. We welcomed Glendon Smith from James D. Klote and Associates, who helped us conduct a successful feasibility study, centering around our proposed capital campaign and our vision for the rebuilding of Browse 'n Buy to also include The Jackson Cupboard, expanded space for the recovery community, and two units of workforce housing. Following our focus group meetings, vestry leadership voted to approve the first phase of the capital campaign.

If the fall brought a shoulder season, we seemed to have missed it around here. The St. John's Campus was in full swing for the entire season with Kids Night Out, Capital Campaign Steering Committee meetings, Red Door poetry series, Women's Luncheons, Ukraine Outreach, Small Group Meetings, Advent Dinners, Gathering Women, and more.

Church, it was a great year for us! We want to express our sincerest gratitude for your generous year-end support of St. John's. We needed some extra support this year. We asked you to consider helping. You showed up with love and generosity at an almost overwhelming level, helping us to finish the year in a strong position, giving us firm footing for 2023. You are a wonderful, loving, generous faith family who does so much for each other and this community we live in and love. Thank you!

VESTRY REPORT

Annie Sampson, Senior Warden

When Jimmy asked me to take on the job of Senior Warden early in 2022, I will admit, I was hesitant. Due to the lack of flexibility in my job and schedule, I wasn't sure I could be there for Jimmy and for the church, if needed. Jimmy reassured me that I could do the job and with his encouragement and with the help of our new Junior Warden, JR Dalby, it's been both an honor and a blessing to me.

Since being appointed, JR and I have been working hard to fine-tune some of the ways the vestry works, and taking feedback from the vestry members on what we can do to improve. According to episcopalchurch. org, it is the responsibility of the vestry to "help define and articulate the mission of the church and to support the mission by word and deed." In addition it is also the vestry's responsibility "to manage the resources and finances of the church."

Each month the vestry looks at the financial statements of the church. We definitely had a few large financial costs that we were not expecting such as the fire suppression system and all the damage that occurred, as well as the sewer line construction, and replacement of the kitchen refrigerator and freezer, to name a few. Thankfully the vestry began budgeting for these types of issues by creating and funding a reserve fund for future maintenance. The additional cost was covered by the enormous generosity of our church members at yearend. We also hired a consultant this year to evaluate the buildings on our campus, and they have prepared a report which the vestry will receive in February. While we were all worried each time an unexpected expense came up, we were blessed with the ability to repair and fully fund each with the generosity of our parishioners.

The vestry spent a large amount of time this year discussing the Browse 'n Buy rebuild project. We were very thorough in asking questions and providing different perspectives. We interviewed and vetted consultants that specialize in church fundraising, and ultimately chose James D. Klote & Associates. We voted unanimously to begin a campaign with them to raise the necessary funds to enhance the love-spreading mission of the church. The campaign is off to a great start and the foundation is being laid to be able to launch the campaign to the congregation and the public in the coming months. We know that the new Browse 'n Buy building will bring a wealth of services and care to those in our community who are in need, following our church mission to lead the way of making a lovespreading difference in our community and beyond.

We've forever changed the way we are bringing church each week and livestreaming services are here to stay! Nothing beats being at St. John's in person, but when you can't, the live-streamed services are a blessing.

We are grateful for those who were able to attend services in person this year. There were **1,941 people** who attended services at The Chapel of the Transfiguration and **8,207 attendees** worshiped St. John's Chapel and St. John's Church at our town campus. In 2022, we have **4,592 views** and **1.34K hours** livestreamed and on demand viewing.

A fun metric that we use is the heat map (shown on the opposite page) highlighting where people are streaming in the United States. In addition, we have folks stream our services from all over world including Bermuda, Canada, Cayman Islands, France, Germany, Mexico, Nigeria, Sweden, and the United Kingdom.

CHAPEL IN THE PARK

The Chapel of the Transfiguration is a sacred space whose witness continues to profoundly affect visitors from around the globe.

Our visiting chaplains serve each summer, and we are blessed to have an impressive array of fine priests who have taken this role. In 2022, we hosted The Rev. Roxanne Friday, Our Father's House/St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming, The Rev. Chip Edens, Rector of Christ Church, Charlotte, North Carolina, and The Rev. Spencer Reece, beloved poet, priest, and painter, Vicar of St. Paul's, Wickford, Rhode Island. Organists included Judy Bowser, Henry Lowe, David Wagner.





STATE OF THE ENDOWMENT

STEWARDING OUR PRESENT FUTURE

The General Reserve Fund along with the seven endowment funds are co-invested and held in trust and managed by five trustees: John Goettler, Chair, Tricia Overdyke, Vice Chair, Eddie Assad, Chad Driewer and Shawn Smith. Jimmy Bartz serves as an ex-officio member of the committee. We work with Judy Singleton and Hadyn Peery of Raymond James. The starting value on 1/1/2022 was \$2,102,165 and the ending value on 12/31/2022 was \$1,485,567. In 2022, a 4% annual draw was disbursed to assist with expenses in Mission, Music, and The Chapel of the Transfiguration. In September, St. John's invested \$250,000 from the General Reserve Fund in real property through a shared equity agreement in St. John's employee housing. Given the downturn of economic markets, the investments incurred a 15.17% loss totaling \$310,604.

We are blessed to have the financial resource to help us pursue our mission. Please consider making arrangements to leave funds in your estate planning to benefit St. John's Episcopal Church. INVESTMENTS IN STAFF & HOUSING

The Willow Park condominium is owned outright by St. John's Church. It has grown greatly in value since its purchase and has provided us the ability to offer consistent accommodations to our wonderful clergy that serve the chapel each summer season. St. John's also holds shared equity in three staff properties. The first property was purchased in 2016 with a \$500,000 contribution, establishing a 37.86% church ownership basis in the property. The second was purchased in 2018 with a contribution of \$250,000 establishing a 37.3% church ownership basis of the property. The third property was purchased in 2022 with a \$500,000 contribution (\$250,000 from General Reserve and \$250,000 from general church savings), establishing a 21.7% church ownership basis in the property. These properties continue to grow in value here in Teton County and support housing for employees of St. John's Episcopal Church.



MEETING MINUTES

St. John's Episcopal Church Annual Meeting

January 30, 2022

The Parish Annual Meeting was led by The Reverend James P. Bartz. The minutes that follow include motions and notable comments from those in attendance. The meeting was hosted on Zoom and there were approximately 23 Zoom participants and 14 attendees in Hansen Hall.

The Reverend James P. Bartz called the meeting to order at 8:47 a.m. and declared a quorum.

Invocation

Review of Minutes of 2021 Parish Meeting – Kathy Stuck made a motion that the 2021 Annual Meeting Minutes be accepted as presented and not read aloud. Dan Land 2nd.

Elections – James P. Bartz

Kathy Stuck announced the new individuals being nominated to serve on Vestry (Ruth Glass, Jessica Jaubert, Cora Ligori), the Endowment Committee (Scott Kirkpatrick) and as representatives to the Diocesan Convention (Judith and Ed Schmitt, John Millar, Ruth Glass), alternates were not named at this time. There were no nominations from the floor. Kathy Stuck moved to accept the slate as recommended. Rob Kass 2nd.

2021 Mission Plan Performance – John Millar,

Treasurer presented highlights

- St. John's Church (SJC)- finances are healthy despite the continued COVID challenges in 2021.
- The annual audit took place with no issues.
- Pledges were less than predicted, with overall contribution income exceeding budget. Total contribution income received totaled \$1,323,093.
 Total Income was \$2,191,225. Dedicated gifts received totaled \$1,349,083. Old Bill's income totaled \$115,387, which exceeded budget by \$55K.
- In addition to the Contribution Income, a \$350K estate gift was received and invested in the General Reserve Fund held at Raymond James.
- An additional grant from the Paycheck Protection Program was received in the amount of \$255,744.
- Came in under budget by \$28K on the expense side. All expenditures over budget were vestry approved.



- The 2022 Plan is close to 2021 and is reasonable.
 SJC ended up with a net of approximately \$300,727
- Dedicated Gifts Donations were \$1,349,083 and expenses were \$170,000 and we will carry a net loss into 2021.
- Main categories of dedicated gifts were the Outreach project, future rebuild of Browse 'N Buy, Foundation of the Diocese of Wyoming, Season of Light, and others.
- SJC Liabilities- liabilities and dedicated income held include:
 - \$50K set aside for deferred maintenance
 - \$5,133 in unspent Period Project grand funds
 - \$7,435 in CT Endowment Funds yet to be transferred to the investment account
 - \$1,262,860 in dedicated gifts

Closing - Church and Missions had a great 2021 Net surplus of \$300,727

Browse 'N Buy (BnB) – had a great year and Lonnie recognized for his hard work.

- BnB net proceeds total \$121,293 for the year
- \$55,000 of that has already been committed to the 2022 SJC budget as a yearend net contribution
- What will be done with the remaining surplus is yet to be determined

Bright Beginnings Episcopal Preschool (BBEP)- Jimmy recognized and presented gifts to the members closed the summer of 2021

- to close Bright Beginnings
- June with a net deficit for the year of \$32,379, plus a liability for unused dedicated tuition assistance funds totaling \$7,818. The final payroll of \$20,615 was paid by St. John's Church. Grant Paycheck Final Comments Protection Program funds were used for payroll.

2022 Mission Plan - John Millar - John reviewed the 2022 Plan and the slight increases in pledges, expenses, salaries and benefits. 2022 estimated to be a great year.

Scott Kirkpatrick offered the importance of capital projects and the need to save for them. Offered a company to provide an estimate of what we should be saving for future projects. (Note: financials and printed materials in their entirety may be requested from the church office. Please contact John for further questions.)

State of the Endowment – John Goettler

John talked about the different funds that comprise the Endowment and the Raymond James investments for those Endowment funds and the General Reserve funds.

- The beginning Endowment balance was \$1,406,349 and the year-end balance was \$1,559,384.
- The General Reserve beginning balance was \$84,060 and the year-end balance was \$542,781.
- There was a General Reserve addition of \$350,855 from an estate gift.
- Credit was given to Judy Singleton and Haydn Peery from Raymond James for their efforts
- Appreciation was given to the members of the Endowment Committee who watch these funds carefully


